Every event in Christchurch to have a sustainability influence: Encourage people to bring reusable containers/bags, take rubbish home or at least sort the rubbish. Distribute information to community groups to encourage people to support such ventures.</p>	<p>Encourage businesses, entrepreneurs to take on circular economy and product stewardship projects. Provide connections between likeminded businesses. Give support, ideas and locations for sorting and processing facilities. Eliminate unnecessary packaging Encourage businesses providing opportunities to return, repair, upgrade or extend the life</p>

<p><u>Discourage Environmental Risk Items</u></p> <p>Certain items need to be banned or awareness created. Items include: Palm Oil, Glitter</p> <p>One use unnecessary items such as: strapping tape, cling film wrap, plastic produce bags, glowsticks, balloons, plastic straws, party poppers, party favours, coffee cups, plastic cutlery</p>	<p>If this is to be done at the local level a stamp could be created to state SOC/CCC do not support the sale of this item.</p> <p>Distribute information to community groups to discourage from purchasing items.</p> <p>Provide alternative suggestions on the sticker or on a website.</p>	<p>Change in legislation to ban such items or at least stating this information must be clear to the consumer.</p> <p>Either encourage this to be done at a government level or create a bylaw</p> <p>Encourage entrepreneurs to find a solution</p>
<p><u>Community Hubs</u></p> <p>Centre point for information and connecting groups with each other and with SOC</p>	<p>Schools – connecting communities</p> <p>Churches – connecting communities</p> <p>Other Community Groups – many are listed on https://chchsharingmap.home.blog/</p> <p>SOC to act as a centre point to connect groups</p>	<p>Libraries – provide information on sustainable living. Measurable incentives between communities creating competitions.</p> <p>Malls – to provide repair, recycle, second hand and hire facilities as per the Waste Minimisation Act 2008. CCC to start the conversation with Malls.</p>
<p><u>Encouraging community involvement</u></p> <p>Getting everyone involved in their local community. Developing timebanks gives community involvement a value and creates an equality of people's time.</p> <p>Time banks could also be linked to a local currency or transport credits.</p> <p>This would encourage the use of local produce and get people at least trying public transport.</p>	<p>Providing support to community groups that already exist. Identify gaps, areas where community groups need to be developed.</p> <p>Motivating enthusiastic people to take on roles in their community.</p> <p>Develop more and encourage the use of Time Banks.</p> <p>We would like to encourage more markets but bylaws can be quite restricting.</p>	<p>Everyone working at the city council should be connected with their local community.</p> <p>This is not to make it council lead but a way for council to set an example to be involved in your local community. Every community will have specific needs. CCC staff living in those areas have an opportunity to recognise gaps for their area and ask for guidance from others to fill those gaps.</p> <p>Opportunity for staff to be paid extra through time banks or a local currency.</p> <p>Provide events opportunities to use timebanks credits for public transport.</p> <p>Review bylaws for setting up markets.</p>

<p><u>Kerbside waste collection</u></p> <p>Development of the system and education to communities.</p> <p>It was a fantastic system for it's time, but it needs to keep up with current needs. A lot less should be going in the red bin. The cost for the yellow bin to be pre-sorted before it gets to EcoSort could be met by savings from keeping resources out of landfill.</p>	<p>Community Hubs listed above to receive information on the Kerbside collection to share with their own members.</p> <p>SOC to help spread the information to community groups.</p>	<p>People are currently confused about the system and education and restoration of faith in the system is required. Recommend letting people know how much money can be saved by the council from sorting correctly. People then have the opportunity to vote what the saved money is spent on.</p> <p>Encouragement of entrepreneurs and R+D to target certain materials. Adopt a resource schemes.</p> <p>Flax/cabbage tree leaves should not be going to landfill!</p>
<p><u>Business Education</u></p> <p>Develop a business sustainability guide any one can pick up and take to their work and make assessments:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Looking at options to minimise resources, buy local. • Looking at opportunities to implement the circular economy or at least minimise packaging and get rid of one-use packaging • Encouragement to hire out items, • Opportunities to enhance staff wellbeing, and encourage equity in the work place • Encouraging staff to connect with their community. <p>Someone may have a task each morning to ensure all rubbish is picked up in their immediate area.</p> <p>Businesses and workers in other locations also need to have someone allocated this role.</p>	<p>SOC to assist getting information to communities encouraging anyone to take the resource to their own work.</p>	<p>CCC to develop the business sustainability guide.</p> <p>Target Sustainability programmes are in place. Programmes need to be developed to include incentives for the circular economy or product stewardship. Businesses should provide options to consumers to extend the life of products (Waste Minimisation Act 2008) through selling second hand, provide repair parts and facilities, take back items for disposal and recycle.</p>
